## Problematising Adult Education as the Object of Comparative Studies

Panel planned collaboratively between ISCAE and the European Society for Research on the Education of Adults (ESREA)

A "golden rule" for comparativists is that two or more objects of study can be compared against a *tertium comparationis* (aka the quality that two things being compared have in common). Thus, much attention in methodological debates has been paid to the qualities that justify a comparison. While the *tertium comparationis* is a topical issue for any comparativist, one more concern should preoccupy scholars in Comparative Adult Education: What do we talk about when we talk about adult education?

In defining our objects of comparative study, we often use standard terms to depict educational provision for adults (like Adult Basic Education; Folk High Schools), pedagogical traditions (like Popular Education), etc. However, those terms may be inappropriate when applied across countries or may even bring confusion as the same terms are sometimes used to depict somewhat different phenomena across the times and spaces of education.

This panel aims to start problematising adult education as the object of comparative studies by sharing reflections with a few panelists with different cultural-linguistic backgrounds and research interests in adult education that engage in comparisons.
